OPINION AND ORDER

Wagner, P.J.

June 25, 2018

Before the Court is Defendant's Omnibus Pretrial Motion, filed on March 15, 2018, seeking suppression of evidence, to wit: controlled substances found on his person subsequent to a warrantless search of a parked vehicle wherein Defendant was found sleeping in the front passenger seat at 5:40 A.M. on January 17, 2018. In support of his motion, Defendant asserts that the seizure of the controlled substances from his person was unlawful because the police officers were without probable cause to search his person.

Hearing on the Omnibus Pretrial Motion was held before this Court on May 24, 2018. At that time, the Commonwealth presented the unsworn testimony of Trooper Robert Schmid of the Pennsylvania State Police who stated that, on January 17, 2018, he and other police officers responded to a call about someone banging on the door of a residence in the Village of Searights, Menallen Township, Fayette County, Pennsylvania, and uttering threats. The occupant of the residence told the officers that the person who had banged and made the threats arrived in a white SUV and was a "tall black male" whom the occupant knew as "Dominique." The white SUV was parked across the street from the residence, and the several troopers made their way to it, where Trooper Schmid observed Defendant reclined in the passenger seat, sleeping. From Trooper Schmid's observation of Defendant, Trooper Schmid was able to tell that Defendant is a tall black male.

As soon as the troopers awakened Defendant, he was removed from the vehicle and placed in handcuffs before he was asked for his name or any form of identification. Immediately upon being handcuffed, Trooper Schmid searched Defendant's person. During said warrantless search, the officer discovered controlled substances, and thereafter filed the instant criminal charges based thereon. Contemporaneously with the search of Defendant's person or very shortly afterward, the troopers ascertained that Defendant was not "Dominique," and they then instituted a search of the physical area in an effort to find Dominique. Defendant now seeks to suppress the evidence of the controlled substances found on his person, claiming that the seizure and warrantless search of his person was without probable cause and thus the seizure of the said evidence was invalid.

Traditionally, courts have recognized three categories of encounters between citizens and police officers: a mere encounter, which generally involves a request for information made by the police, does not need to be supported by any level of suspicion and does not compel the citizen to engage with the officers; an investigative detention, which must be supported by reasonable suspicion and subjects the citizen to a stop and a short period of detention, but does not involve the coercive conditions which constitute the functional equivalent of an arrest; and a custodial detention, also known as an arrest, which must be supported by probable cause. Commonwealth v. Collins, 950 A.2d 1041 (Pa.Super. 2008).

There can be no doubt that under the circumstances herein that the troopers would have been justified in conducting a short, non-coercive investigative detention of Defendant since they had been told by the apartment resident that a black male who had exited a white SUV had made threats after banging on the residence door in the wee hours of the morning. An investigative detention is justified when a police officer has a reasonable suspicion that criminal activity is afoot. Commonwealth v. Williams, 980 A.2d 667 (Pa.Super.2009). An investigative detention would have allowed the trooper to conduct a pat-down and frisk of Defendant's person so the officer could continue investigating without fear for his safety, but its purpose is not to discover evidence. The "plain feel exception" to the search warrant requirement in conjunction with a Terry frisk allows a police officer to confiscate a non-threatening object if it is immediately apparent during the pat-down that the object is contraband; that is, the officer readily perceives, without further search, that what he is feeling is contraband. Minnesota v. Dickerson, 508 U.S. 366, 113 S.Ct. 2130, 124 L.Ed.2d 334 (1993).

Instantly, however, it is very apparent that the interaction between Defendant and these several state troopers was not an investigative detention, but rather an actual arrest complete with handcuffs and a full search of Defendant's person, not merely a safety based pat-down. Probable cause is made out when "the facts and circumstances which are within the knowledge of the officer at the time of the arrest, and of which he has reasonably trustworthy information, are sufficient to warrant a man of reasonable caution in the belief that the suspect has committed or is committing a crime." Commonwealth v. Rodriguez, 526 Pa. 268, 585 A.2d 988, 990 (1991). The facts and circumstances within knowledge of the troopers when Defendant was arrested and searched were not sufficient to warrant a police officer of reasonable caution in the belief that Committed a crime. The troopers did not personally observe any suspicious behavior by Defendant; they knew only that he is a black male who was sitting in a white SUV. See Com. v. Dixon, 2010 PA Super 109, 997 A.2d 368 (2010).

The facts and circumstances of this case are closely akin to those set forth in the case of Com. v. McIntosh, 2014 WL 10881425 (Pa. Super. Ct. Aug. 26, 2014)

(Memorandum). Therein, a police officer received a report from another citizen that four black males had committed a crime and left the scene in a vehicle. A short time later, the officer arrested the appellant and his companions even though the description of the culprits lacked any specificity and failed to describe the facial features, clothing, age, or any other identifying characteristic of the men the citizen had initially observed. The only identifying characteristics of note were the fact that the men were black and that there were four of them. The men stopped by Officer Carbaugh, including Appellant, only fit the racial aspect of Dunn's description, which is, in and of itself, not a particularly individualized description in the context of this case. When the police officer stopped Appellant and his companions, he did not observe any suspicious behavior on their part. The only identifying characteristics of note were the fact that the men were black and that there were four of them. As the Pennsylvania Superior Court stated, "Given the totality of these circumstances, it is clear that [the officer] lacked probable cause to arrest Appellant. Specifically, he lacked reasonably trustworthy information that Appellant and his companions were the same individuals observed by [the citizen witness]. Id. at 5.

Given the paucity of any identifying information in this case, and the arrest of Defendant as soon as the troopers observed him and awakened him, the arrest was clearly not based on probable cause, and thus is invalid. The arrest being unlawful, it follows that the warrantless search of Defendant's person cannot be upheld. The Court finds that suppression of the physical evidence obtained during the search of Defendant's person is required as fruit of the poisonous tree. See Commonwealth v. Stevenson, 560 Pa. 345, 744 A.2d 1261 (Pa. 2000); Commonwealth v. Graham, 554 Pa. 472, 721 A.2d 1075 (Pa. 1998).

Accordingly, the Court enters the following:

ORDER

AND NOW, June 25, 2018, the within Omnibus Pre-trial Motion is GRANTED. The physical evidence of the controlled substances seized from the person of the Defendant on January 17, 2018, is hereby SUPPRESSED.
