#### **OPINION**

No. 1619 of 2022

Linda R. Cordaro, J.

February 17, 2023

Currently before this Court is the Defendant's Omnibus Pretrial Motion for writ of habeas (Count I).

During the January 23, 2023 hearing on the Motion, as to Count I, the parties consented to admission of the preliminary hearing transcript as evidence upon which to render a decision. Counts II and III also were presented at the hearing, and this Court's decisions as to those Counts were set forth in its orders of January 25, 2023.

After a review of the preliminary hearing transcript, Count I is granted in part and denied in part for the reasons set forth below.

## **BACKGROUND**

The following facts were established via preliminary hearing testimony as in the transcript admitted into evidence at the January 23, 2023 hearing. On or about June 14, 2022, thirteen-year-old J.T. received the message "hey beautiful" via the social media application Snapchat from a "Joey Smith." J.T. asked him to leave her alone and told him she was thirteen. Beginning on or about June 17, 2022 until June 24, 2022, the same individual initiated contact with J.T. through Snapchat again. He asked if she had any friends, and she gave the names of two other minors: H.H. (thirteen years old) and I.F. (twelve years old). J.T. later posted a photograph of herself and the other two minors, from which the Defendant was able to obtain Snapchat contact information for the other two minors based on the tags in the photograph. A group chat was opened to include the three minors and "Joey Smith."

On June 24, 2022, the Defendant contacted J.T. via Snapchat and said he wanted to meet up. J.T. immediately called H.H., who wanted to know why he wanted to meet. When asked, the Defendant said he wanted to meet for sexual acts, and, again when asked, confirmed that money was involved. According to J.T., "they" set up a group chat, and H.H. began figuring out times and prices. Ultimately, the agreement was that the Defendant would pay each of the three minors \$60.00 for a blowjob and \$130.00 to

H.H. for sex. After the prices were decided, the Defendant sent a picture of his penis to J.T. and H.H.

The Defendant asked where the meeting could take place. He suggested his house in Charleroi, H.H.'s house, or in his vehicle. The minors rejected each suggestion. H.H. then suggested the Comfort Inn, and it was agreed that the Defendant would meet them at the McDonald's in Connellsville before going to the hotel.

The three minors walked to the McDonald's and identified the Defendant in a white Jeep based on the description of the vehicle he had given them. The minors got into the back seat of the vehicle, and the Defendant began driving. There was a bag of alcoholic drinks in the vehicle, including Pink Whitney and Jim Beam, which the Defendant gave the minors. The Defendant initially drove the wrong way to reach the hotel but turned the vehicle around when H.H. informed him of this.

When they arrived at the Comfort Inn, the minors went inside with the Defendant. As the Defendant spoke to the front desk to check in, J.T. heard him say that he was the minors' uncle and give his last name as "Johnson." It surprised her that this name was not the one she knew from the Snapchat profile. While in the lobby, H.H. texted and called another friend and asked him to come get them. The minors then went with the Defendant to Room 308.

Upon entering the room, J.T. sat on the bed, I.F. sat on a chair, and H.H. remained standing. The Defendant stood facing them with his back to the door and asked them their names. H.H. asked to see the money, and I.F. asked to count it. The Defendant took out money and handed it to I.F. Then, H.H. received a text or call from the friend she had previously contacted. J.T. and H.H. left the room, and I.F. put the money in her pocket and left the room as well. All three minors ran out of the hotel. J.T. testified that the amount of money matched to the total that had been agreed upon. She also confirmed that the original plan was not to take the money and run: although the other two minors did not want to do anything with the Defendant, the plan was for H.H. to have sex with him in exchange for money.

Corporal Brian Kendi {1} responded to a call of suspicious activity at the Comfort Inn and spoke to the front desk employee who informed him of an older male with three juvenile girls. Corporal Kendi obtained the Defendant's name and matched it to an individual in Charleroi. On June 27, 2022, Corporal Kendi made contact with the Defendant, who was being held in the Westmoreland County Jail. Corporal Kendi subsequently interrogated the Defendant, and that interrogation was recorded.

<sup>{1}</sup> The preliminary hearing transcript did not specify the police department to which Corporal Kendi belonged. However, according to the Affidavit of Probable Cause, he was with the Connellsville Police.

#### DISCUSSION

A petition for a writ of habeas is "the proper means for testing a pre-trial finding that the Commonwealth has sufficient evidence to establish a prima facie case" against a defendant. Commonwealth v. Scott, 578 A.2d 933,936 (Pa. Super. Ct. 1990). A pre-trial petition writ of habeas corpus is similar in its purpose to a preliminary hearing in that it seeks to prevent unlawful detention for a crime which was never committed, or for a crime for which there is no evidence of the accused's connection. Id. at 937. Accordingly, to establish its prima facie case, the Commonwealth must present evidence as to each material element of the crimes charged and establish sufficient probable cause that the accused is the person who committed the offenses. Commonwealth v. McBride, 595 A2d 589, 591 (Pa. 1991).

The Defendant challenges the following charges:

Counts 7 - 9 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 2902(b)(1) - unlawful restraint of a minor - risk of bodily injury

Counts 10 -12 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 2902(b)(2) - unlawful restraint of a minor- involuntary servitude

Counts 16 - 18 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 2909(a) - concealment of whereabouts of child

Counts 19 - 20 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 291o(a) - lure child into motor vehicle

Counts 22 - 24 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 3011(a)(1) -trafficking in individuals

Count 37 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 4910(1) - tampering with physical evidence

Count 38 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 5105 - hindering apprehension/prosecution

The elements of the charges at Counts 7 - 9 for unlawful restraint of a minor with risk of bodily injury include: (1) the victim is under 18 years of age; (2) the person is not the victim's parent; and (3) the person restrains another unlawfully in circumstances exposing the victim to risk of serious bodily injury. Here, the victims were under 18 years of age, and the Defendant is not the parent of any of them. However, there is no evidence the minors were placed in circumstances that posed a risk of serious bodily injury. The Motion is granted with respect to Counts 7 - 9.

The elements of the charges at Counts 10 - 12 for unlawful restraint of a minor involuntary servitude include: (1) the victim is under 18 years of age; (2) the person is not the victim's parent; and (3) the person holds another in a condition of involuntary servitude. "Involuntary servitude" occurs when an individual has been deprived of freedom of choice and is subjected to the will of another for any amount of time. See Commonwealth v. Wells, 460 A.2d 328, 330 (Pa. Super. Ct. 1983). There is no evidence that the minors here were deprived of choice nor that they were forced to act or otherwise comply with the will of the Defendant. In fact, while the minors were in Defendant's vehicle on the way to the hotel, one of them informed the Defendant he was going the wrong way, and the Defendant adjusted course in response. The Motion is granted with respect to Counts 10 - 12.

The elements of the charges at Counts 16 - 18 for concealment of the whereabouts of a child include: (1) the person removes a child from the child's known place of residence; (2) the person intends to conceal the child's whereabouts from the child's parent or guardian. As the statute specifies, the term "removes" includes personally removing

the child, causing the child to be removed, or preventing the child's return. There is no evidence that the Defendant removed the minors from their residences or caused them to be removed, nor evidence that he intended to conceal their whereabouts. The Motion is granted with respect to Counts 16 - 18.

The elements of the charges at Counts 19 - 20 for luring a child into a motor vehicle include: (1) the person lures or attempts to lure an individual under the age of 18 into a motor vehicle; (2) the person does so without the consent of the individual's parent. The offense is a felony of the second degree if it involves a child under 13 years of age; otherwise, it is a misdemeanor of the first degree. Defendant is charged with three counts of the offense as a felony of the second degree. However, according to testimony at the preliminary hearing, only I.T. was under thirteen years of age at the time, while J.T. and H.H. had reached age thirteen. Therefore, the Motion is granted with respect to Counts 19 and 20.

The Defendant is charged at Counts 22 - 24 with trafficking in individuals as set forth in 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 3011(a)(1):

- (a) Offense defined. -- A person commits a felony:
  - (1) of the first degree if the person recruits, entices, solicits, advertises, harbors, transports, provides, obtains or maintains an individual if the person knows or recklessly disregards that the individual will be subject to sexual servitude.

According to the comment to the statute, "[s]exual servitude of a minor occurs whenever any sexual conduct or performance involving sexual conduct of a minor occurs, regardless of the presence of force, fraud or coercion on the part of the person inducing or receiving the conduct." Defendant argues that since sexual conduct did not actually occur in this case, the elements of the crime as charged have not been met. However, the statute describes the facilitation of sexual servitude as the criminal activity. It is not reasonable to interpret this to mean that facilitation is not a crime if a victim manages to escape or otherwise evade sexual conduct. Here, there is evidence that Defendant enticed and solicited the minors by negotiating payment for sexual acts. He also transported the minors in his vehicle, all while knowing they would be subject to sexual servitude because he was to be the recipient. The Motion is denied with respect to Counts 22 - 24.

The elements of the charge at Count 37 for tampering with physical evidence include: (1) the person knew an official proceeding or investigation was pending; (2) the person alters, destroys, conceals or removes any record, document or thing; (3) the person intends to impair the verity or availability of the item. Commonwealth v. Yasipour, 957 A2d 734, 745 (Pa. Super. Ct. 2008). Here, the Commonwealth has presented no evidence that the Defendant knew an investigation was pending. In addition, 'although there is testimony from Corporal Kendi that the Defendant said he deleted his Snapchat on June 25, 2020, this is only hearsay. No other evidence of deletion has been presented, and a prima facie case cannot rely solely and exclusively upon hearsay. Commonwealth v. McClelland, 233 A.3d 717,736 (Pa. 2020). The Motion is granted with respect to Count 37.

The elements of the charge at Count 38 for hindering apprehension or prosecution include that: (1) a person has the intent to hinder apprehension, prosecution, conviction, or punishment of another for a crime; and (2) the person conceals or destroys evidence of the crime. Here, the Defendant is the only alleged offender. Since no other individual is mentioned, the Defendant cannot be said to have acted with intent to hinder the apprehension or prosecution of another. The Motion is granted with respect to Count 38.

#### CONCLUSION

Count I of the Motion is granted with respect to Information Counts 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 16, 17, 18, 37, and 38, which shall be dismissed. Count I of the Motion is granted with respect to Information Counts 19 and 20, which shall be graded as misdemeanors of the second degree. The Motion is denied with respect to Information Counts 22, 23, and 24.

#### ORDER

AND NOW, this 17th day of February, 2023 in consideration of Defendant's Omnibus Pretrial Motion and after a hearing on the matter, Count I (writ of habeas) being the only count remaining for disposition, it is hereby ORDERED and DIRECTED that Count I of the Motion is GRANTED IN PART and DENIED IN PART.

- 1) Information Counts 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 16, 18, 37, and 38 shall be DISMISSED;
- 2) Information Counts 19 and 20 shall be graded as misdemeanors of the second degree;
- 3) The Motion with respect to Information Counts 22 24 is DENIED.
